



Wyoming is home to many firsts – Yellowstone, the nation’s first National Park; Devils Tower, the nation’s first National Monument; and the first U.S. National Forest, Shoshone. Along with these firsts, Wyoming is also home to Grand Teton National Park, which may be found just south of Yellowstone. The jagged peaks of the Teton Mountains rise nearly 14,000 feet into the vast blue sky.

In Yellowstone, the 10,000 thermal features offer a truly unique experience. Waterfalls spill over the sides of a gigantic caldera that traces the edge of an ancient volcanic eruption. Between Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks, you will find an array of wildlife including, bison, elk, wolves, grizzly and black bears, eagles, and more. Throughout the state, moose, coyotes, and deer flourish.

In addition to the natural beauty of Wyoming, it is also known as the “Cowboy State”, where you can see wild horses running free on plains of sagebrush and tumbleweeds. Visit canyon lands that sheltered legendary outlaws like Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid. Watch rodeo cowboys ride bulls and bucking broncos or discover the magic of quiet nights and skies sparkling with stars.

Visit the “year-round mountain town” of Casper; soak in the hot springs of Thermopolis and Saratoga; experience Native American Culture in Wind River country; take in the state capital of Cheyenne; or simply go for a scenic drive through the Big Horn Mountains.

After visiting Wyoming, you’ll understand how some things can’t be explained, only experienced.



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CLIMATE

Wyoming consists of high plain plateaus, mountain ranges, and desert land, with elevations ranging from 3,125 feet (953 meters) to nearly 14,000 feet (4,267 meters). These dramatic changes in elevation create a varied climate with cool yearly temperatures (averaging 46.4F, 8C), low humidity, and only 41 days of measurable precipitation.

Don't let the cool average fool you though, Wyoming offers more than 65% of sunny days and blue skies throughout the year.

TRANSPORTATION

Interstate 80 runs east/west across the southern part of Wyoming. Interstate 90 runs east/west through the northern region. Interstate 25 runs north/south through the state. Each route offers easy access to major airline hubs such as Denver and Salt Lake City.

Air service into Wyoming includes flights from the gateway cities of Atlanta, Chicago, Dallas, Denver, New York City, Los Angeles, and Salt Lake City. United, Delta, Frontier, and American Airlines offer nonstop air service to a variety of Wyoming towns.

SCENIC DRIVES IN THE COWBOY STATE

Wyoming is home to 17 Scenic Byways, five scenic backways (usually dirt roads), and one Historic Mine Trail. Whether you are planning a day trip, headed to one of our National or State Parks, or driving through the state towards another destination, a Scenic Drive is never too far away.

One such byway, is also recognized as an All American Road, that is the [Beartooth Scenic Byway](#) in northwest Wyoming. This byway rolls over the Beartooth Mountains on Wyoming's highest highway, past alpine lakes and forests and through the Absaroka Mountains ultimately leading into Yellowstone.

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PARK TO PARK

SALT TO STONE

Venturing along the western portion of the state, visit some amazing natural locations up to the northwest corner of the state. Visit Bear River State Park in Evanston and Fossil Butte National Monument, Wyoming's newest national monument.

Continue north and discover the Museum of the Mountain Man in Pinedale, before exploring Jackson Hole, Grand Teton National Park, and Yellowstone National Park.

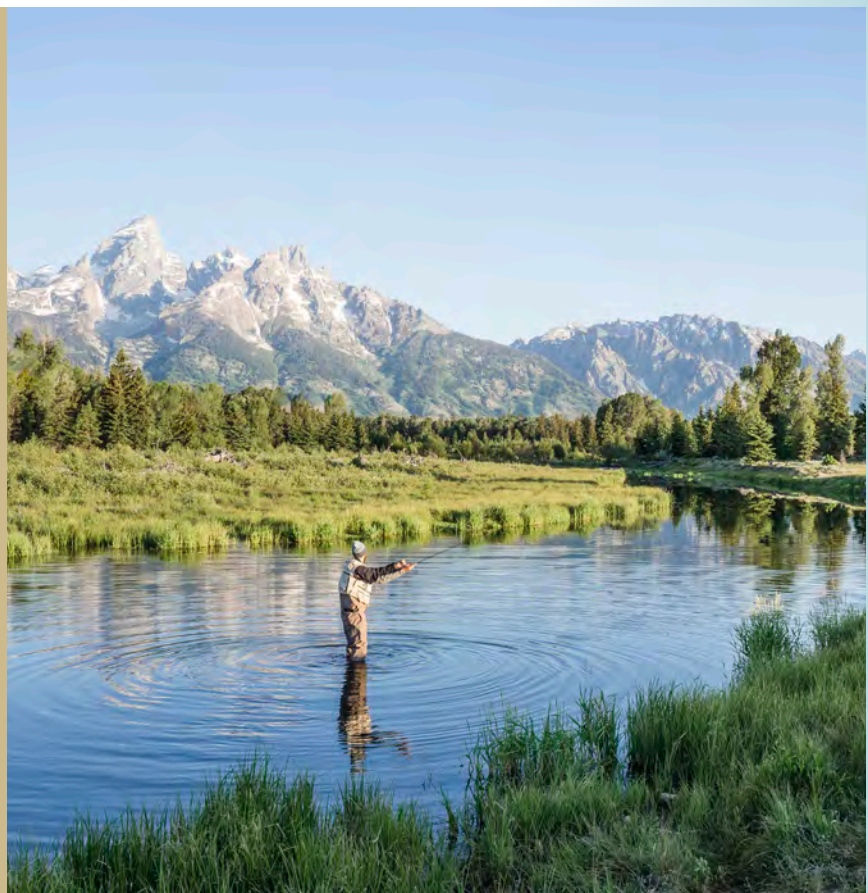
ROCKIES TO TETONS
